WXOX Notes EAS Failure as Plane Crashes in Louisville

On November 4th, Louisville was devastated by a plane crash at 5:20 PM in the evening. That same day, WXOX radio was alarmed by the lack of response from their Emergency Alert System.

At first, DJ Aron Solo did not understand what he was seeing as



WOZO Radio Joins Pacifica Network

Pacifica Network joyfully welcomes WOZO radio as a new affiliate.
Broadcasting from Knoxville,
Tennessee, WOZO is known as *The People's Radio*. The station manager is Pan Walker.

We are a community-based, noncommercial, local low-power FM (LPFM) radio station operating out of a secret location in the Old Sevier black smoke rose south of downtown. Quickly, he contacted the station manager, Sharon Scott. Together, they pondered billowing black smokefilled skies and could only guess where it originated.

Within a day, investigations would show that, shortly after takeoff, a UPS cargo plane headed for Honolulu had barreled downwards and collided with a petroleum recycling facility. Multiple explosions caused massive clouds of smoke. Hundreds of fire fighters were called to the scene. 14 people were killed.

But at that moment, information was sparce.

Scott wrote about the community radio station's response to the sudden catastrophe in *Radio World*.

"It will be months," she said, — possibly years — before we know the full extent of the toxic fumes that were released from this impact. But within minutes, thanks to our rapid-response volunteer network, ART FM was able to get the word out to our listeners on WXOX 97.1 FM — "STAY AWAY FROM THE AREA."

Commissioner Gomez Comments on News Distortion Policy

In November, FCC Commissioner
Anna Gomez acknowledged the
reasoning behind a formal petition
requesting the FCC to rescind its
News Distortion policy —
Democracy.org called the policy "an
outdated rule that has increasingly
been weaponized to chill press
freedom and silence critical
journalism."

In her statement, Commissioner
Gomez said, "The FCC does not have
the authority, the ability, or the
constitutional right to go after
broadcasters for their news content.
The Communications Act forbids the
Commission from censoring
broadcasters, and the First
Amendment protects journalistic
choices from government intimidation.
Nevertheless, this FCC has deployed
a vague and ineffective News
Distortion policy as a weapon to
stretch its licensing authority and
pressure newsrooms.

The deeper story here is about how the United States defines its public goods. These—including roads, libraries, clean water, schools—exist because societies decide that some things are too vital to privatize. Public broadcasting was once understood in the same way: free, fact-based information as a foundation for democracy.

But in the Congressional hearings that led to CPB's demise, that principle collapsed. Instead of grappling with whether all Americans deserve equal access to information and culture, lawmakers staged a partisan spectacle—attacking NPR's editorial decisions, weaponizing antitransgender rhetoric, and fixating on Hunter Biden's laptop. The real

"The First Amendment is a pillar of our democracy. As federal regulators, we must respect the rule of law, uphold the Constitution, and ensure that a free press is never subjected to regulatory interference by the FCC."

The petition was created by a bipartisan coalition of former FCC chairs and commissioners. It was made in response to FCC Chairman Brendan Carr's citing of the News Distortion policy against ABC. Carr himself had threatened to revoke the network's affiliate licenses over comments made by late-night host Jimmy Kimmel. The comments were in regards to the presidential response to Charlie Kirk's murder.

question of whether or not the public has a right to free information and representation was ignored.

And when the axe fell, the answer was no.

The consequences are stark.

Defunding CPB won't dent NPR's executives or flagship programs. But it will devastate the thousands of non-NPR stations that sustain rural and tribal communities. The Government Accountability Office and the CPB have long warned that up to half of rural stations could close without federal support.
